#### WE'RE HIRING

Professional Liability Insurance Vulnerable Sector Checks CCP Updates – Webinar Registrant Portal Guide – Self-assessment and Learning Plans Other CCP resources

Due to changes in the renewal process and the online registration portal, dietitians are strongly encouraged to initiate the renewal process well in advance of the **February 28, 2025, deadline**.

### **RENEWAL Q&A**

#### Q: I submitted a vulnerable sector check to NSCDN in 2024, do I need to provide a new check?

A: No, a new vulnerable sector check is not required. The College has a record of all previously submitted checks. When completing the profile update portion of renewal, please enter the date of issue of the previously submitted vulnerable sector check.

# Q: My employer provides professional liability insurance coverage; do I need an additional policy?

A: Yes, all active practice licensees are required to have professional liability insurance in their own name. Practice specific or employer insurance is not acceptable. Proof of professional liability insurance in the dietitian's name must be included with the renewal application.

#### Q: How can I obtain individual professional liability insurance coverage?

A: The Professional Liability Insurance page on the College website provides a list of insurance options that align with the Professional Liability Insurance Policy. Any policy that fulfills all the requirements outlined in the NSCDN Liability Insurance Policy is also acceptable. Note: If purchasing insurance coverage through Aon, please allow several weeks for processing.



#### Q: What date must individual professional liability insurance be effective?

A: The policy must be effective by April 1, 2025, when the new insurance requirements take effect. If the provider cannot issue insurance with an April 1 start date before the February 28, 2025, renewal deadline, the policy may start earlier. Dietitians must maintain continuous coverage beyond this date, and proof of insurance must be submitted with the renewal application.

# Q: I don't have all my documents ready to submit but I want to work on my learning plan, is that possible?


A: Yes, you can complete the learning plan by following the instructions in the registrant portal guide. If you have started a renewal and have not completed the profile update form, you will be blocked from accessing learning plans. You can withdraw the profile update form in order to regain access to your learning plans.

## Q. I uploaded my vulnerable sector check and proof of liability insurance, but I can't see them on my registration profile. Why is that?

**A.** Documents uploaded through the online registration portal cannot be viewed by licensees or applicants due to the system's prebuilt processes and functionality. However, NSCDN staff can access these documents once they have been uploaded. If there are any issues with the uploaded documents, the NSCDN will return the application for the registrant to request any necessary changes.

#### Q: Is it possible to change the indicators selected on the self-assessment?

A: Yes, you can update your self-assessment through your dashboard. To do so, select 'all' to view all indicators and choose the ones you want to use. Be sure to uncheck the indicators you previously selected before selecting new ones.





# Q: Can I use the same indicator for both goals? Can I use the same indicators for next year's goals?

A: Yes, both goals can be based on the same indicator, and future goals can also be based on previously used indicators. However, it is important that the learning goals remain distinct, even if they fall under the same indicator.

### REGULATED HEALTH PROFESSIONS ACT

The Nova Scotia Government introduced the Regulated Health Professions Act (RHPA) in 2023, a common foundations legislation applicable to all regulated health professions in Nova Scotia. Once dietetic regulations are proclaimed, the RHPA will replace the Dietitians Act 2009. We anticipate a complete transition to RHPA legislation and regulations by late spring or summer of 2025. The College will distribute applicable updates concerning regulatory changes associated with this legislation through email and the NSCDN Website.

### PRESCRIBING UPDATE

The NSCDN has been working diligently on the process for dietitians to achieve authorized prescriber status. Despite our best efforts, this process is currently delayed due to circumstances beyond the College's control. The NSCDN has been advised of an updated timeline, with an estimated minimum delay of 12 months before dietitians can be integrated into external systems required for authorized prescriber recognition within the Nova Scotia healthcare system.

In the meantime, dietitians can continue to perform tasks within the dietetic scope of practice that do not require authorized prescriber status, such as writing diet orders for therapeutic or texture-modified diets or conducting swallowing assessments. Dietitians must ensure they are educated, trained, and competent in these tasks, hold professional liability insurance covering all professional activities, and comply with their employer's policies.
